A Word from the Wilsons

The stadium is full, waiting for the coin toss that will begin the football game. The usually rowdy pre-game crowd suddenly silences as hundreds of people—players, coaches, and staff from both teams— kneel together at mid-field. Hats and helmets off, they join hands and hearts as Nebraska assistant coach Ron Brown leads them in prayer.

Penn State English professor Heather Holleman watches in amazement on her TV at home. "Is this normal?" she asks her husband Ashley. "No, this isn't normal," he replies.

But then, the whole past week had been anything but normal. As news broke of criminal sexual abuse charges filed against a former Penn State assistant coach, a media maelstrom descended on the small college town. Things went from bad to worse as prominent university officials—including Penn State's revered longtime coach, Joe Paterno—were fired, and students rioted in response.

It is in dark times like these that Christ's light shines brightest, offering both hope and healing. *Campus Crusade* staff at Penn State are reaching out to their shocked and grieving community and telling them about Jesus' love and forgiveness.

Our *Athletes in Action* staff at Penn State helped to set up the prayer at midfield before the game. It was an incredible visual statement of faith as the game was broadcast around the nation.

The director of our *Cru* student ministry at Penn State delivered a moving speech to a standing room only crowd at their regular weekly meeting. Students reported that "they never felt the presence of the Holy Spirit so powerfully."
